For those of you who do not know me, I am a community emergency physician currently practicing at Conemaugh Miners Medical Center in northern Cambria County. I am two months in to my presidency term and we are working hard on behalf of the emergency physicians and patients across the state!

We have been very busy on the advocacy front alongside our lobbyists Bigley and Blikle, LLC. On June 4th we attended the House of Medicine Reception in Harrisburg. In conjunction with the PA Orthopedic Society, we met with Representative Arvind Venkat, MD (D, Allegheny). Speaker of the House Joanna McClinton also dropped in. While in the Capitol, we presented Rep. Venkat the PACEP Legislator of the Year Award as he was unable to attend our awards reception at Kalahari in May. We also met with Senator David G. Argall (R, Schuylkill) who is the prime sponsor of the Certificate of Merit legislation and Representative Dan Frankel (D, Allegheny) who is the House Health Committee Chair and the prime sponsor for non-compete legislation. On Monday, June 10th PACEP along with the Pennsylvania Orthopedic Society and the Pennsylvania Coalition for Civil Justice Reform held a Medical Liability Reform Press Conference at the Capitol. PACEP Board Member, Dr. Annahieta Kalantari spoke on behalf of PACEP and shared comments on how the mitigate the looming medical liability crisis caused by the reintroduction of trial lawyer "venue shopping."

ACEP Council 2024 preparation is in full swing over the summer. Before I got involved with PACEP I didn't even know what council was or that it even existed. For those of you who were like me and may not know, the ACEP Council consists of members representing ACEP's 53 chartered chapters (50 states, Puerto Rico, the District of Columbia and Government Services), its sections of membership, the Association of Academic Chairs in Emergency Medicine (AACEM), the Council of Emergency Medicine Residency Directors (CORD), the Emergency Medicine Residents' Association (EMRA) and the Society for Academic Emergency Medicine (SAEM). The Council is a deliberative body that meets once a year for two days

THE STATE BUDGET NEGOTIATIONS CONTINUE BEYOND JUNE 30 DEADLINE

With the June 30 state budget deadline in the rearview mirror, House, Senate, and Shapiro Administration negotiations continued their discussions beyond the July 4th holiday weekend. Both chambers returned to voting session during the week of July 8 with the final resolution achieved on July 11. The \$47.6 billion spending plan at 11 PM that night.

NON-COMPETE AGREEMENT LEGISLATION MOVING

HB 1633 PN 3487, legislation to ban non-compete agreement for medical professionals, passed the legislature and was presented to Governor Josh Shapiro on July 12. The bill was sponsored by House Health Committee Chair Dan Frankel (D, Allegheny). The final version, which is effective on January 1, 2025, would:

- Define health care practitioners as a medical doctor, an osteopathic doctor, a certified registered nurse anesthetist, a certified registered nurse practitioner, and a physician's assistance.
- 2) Modifies the definition of noncompete covenant to state that the agreement would have the effect of impeding the health care practitioner's ability to continue to treat patients or accept new patients.
- Allow an employer to enforce a noncompete agreement for one year.
- Retain the employer cost recovery and patient notification provisions.

TELEMEDICINE LEGISLATION SIGNED INTO LAW

Governor Josh Shapiro signed SB 739 PN 1670 on July 3. Act 42 of 2024 takes effect in 90 days. PACEP's lobbying team was able to ensure that Remote Patient Monitoring and other important elements were retained in the legislation. SB 739 was sponsored by Senator Elder Vogel (R, Beaver, Butler, Lawrence).

CRNP INDEPENDENT PRACTICE ADVANCES IN THE SENATE

SB 25 PN 1797, legislation to provide CRNPs independent practice, was amended by the Senate Consumer ProSB 25 PN 1797, legislation to provide CRNPs independent practice, was amended by the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee on July 1. Sponsored by Senate Camera Bartolotta (R, Beaver, Greene, Washington).

The amended bill establishes the Rural Certified Registered Nurse Practitioners Health Care Access Program to allow an eligible rural CRNP to practice as an independent primary healthcare practitioner without a written or collaborative agreement with a physician in a rural area. A rural area is defined as a county with a population density of fewer than 291 people per square mile based on the 2020 census or a county as specifically designated.

SB 25 was slated for further Senate action several times during the July session but was pulled from consideration primarily due to the House of Medicine's grassroots efforts in which PACEP members participated. We thank you for your support of PACEP's advocacy campaign.

CERTIFICATE OF MERIT MEDICAL LIABILITY REFORM INTRODUCED

Senator David Argall (R, Carbon, Luzerne, and Schuylkill Counties) introduced SB 1182 PN 1602 on May 17. The bill is in response to the state Supreme Court's action to usher trial lawyer venue shopping back into Pennsylvania's medical liability system. SB 1182 was referred to the Senate Judiciary Committee.

To initiate a medical liability lawsuit, the plaintiff's attorney needs only affirm that a physician certified that the claim has merit. No medical report or statement is required nor is the Certificate of Merit evidence that the defendant physician may challenge. SB 1182 will remedy this defect and reduce frivolous filings.

Specifically, the legislation would:

- Define and establish the credentials of a licensed professional who reviews a claim of medical liability.
- 2) Establish a process in which the statement of the licensed professional who has reviewed the claim will be shared with the defendant medical professional and will require that the statement is shared at the time of filing the certificate of merit.
- Require, as part of the statement, that the licensed professional be identified, and their curriculum vitae be included as part of the Certificate of Merit filing.



Peer Mentorship in Residency

Wellness Committees have become an important part of Graduate **Medical Education across the** country. At Geisinger Medical **Center our Emergency Medicine** Wellness Committee's goal was to evaluate and support the needs of our residents regarding their professional, physical, emotional, and environmental wellness. Over the past year, the committee decided that a peer mentorship program would be critical to help achieve its goal. The "Big-Little" Program was created to support incoming interns as they transition from medical school to residency and help build camaraderie within the residency program.

Peer mentoring has been shown to increase socialization and decrease symptoms of burnout. It provides a safe place for team members to vent their frustrations and work through solutions to problems they may encounter in the workplace. Faculty mentoring can increase career success in the form of research, professional development, and counseling. However, it can be intimidating for an intern to approach faculty about resident-specific issues that they are facing for the first time. Peer mentorship can help bridge this gap, so interns are able to express concerns to a designated group of peers who provide support and guidance if conflicts arise. It also develops leadership skills of upper-level residents as mentors.

"My goal with the "Big-Little" program was to help interns and second years' transitions a little bit easier." says Hope Allen, former chief resident, and codeveloper of the "Big-Little" program.

"For the interns, moving to a new place, meeting all new people, and essentially starting over can be daunting. Having someone to talk about where to live, what restaurants or grocery stores are around, how to prepare for day one at the hospital, etc. would hopefully make the transition into residency easier. For the second years, having a PGY-3 to talk to about jobs and fellowships, new upper-level responsibilities, patient volumes, etc. from someone who just went through the process and can give them accurate and insider knowledge could help ease the transition from intern to upper".

We matched 2nd and 3rd-year residents with a new intern and provided a loose outline of check-in requirements throughout the year. Upper-level residents were also provided with discussion points and goals that should be accomplished at these check-ins. Uppers reached out to their interns right after the Match and formal checkins began during June orientation and continued throughout the year. Topics covered at check-ins included: off-service rotation feedback, difficult clinical cases/outcomes, issues with home and family, future goals, and aspirations, and job frustrations. When talking about the mentorship program, interns "liked the support system from various residents at different levels of training allowing them to gain insight into the residency as a whole".

Peer mentoring has been well received in our residency and is an easy to incorporate strategy to help interns feel connected to a program immediately after match day and build camaraderie within a program.

JUNE 2024 ACEP BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

The ACEP Board of Directors met in Dallas on June 26 and 27, 2024.

A summary of the Board's discussions and actions during this meeting:

- Several policy and position statements were approved, revised, and/or returned to the respective committees for additional input.
- Approved 2024-25 budget.

PACEP Research Committee Update

Congratulations to the Pennsylvania Chapter of the American College of Emergency Physicians for being selected as a recipient a Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board grant for "Reducing Underage Drinking and Dangerous Drinking".

The Research Council will be working with PACEP Board to implement the proposal. The proposed project will use the funding to organize educational classes that leverage the expertise of emergency physicians and nurses to address the critical issue of underage and dangerous drinking. The classes will employ real-life experiences and practical demonstrations, enhancing participants' understanding of the consequences of drunk driving. The use of Drunk Busters of America's Goggles will simulate high levels of intoxication,

providing a firsthand experience of the diminished capacity associated with impaired driving. In particular, this approach will emphasize health and well-being rather than take a law enforcement point of view.

Pre- and post-class surveys will be conducted to measure the effectiveness of the educational sessions. The surveys will gather data on participants' knowledge, attitudes, and behaviors related to underage and dangerous drinking, enabling us to assess the impact of the classes.

The initiative will collaborate with local schools, community centers, and youth organizations to ensure broad outreach. By engaging with diverse community groups, we aim to address the issue comprehensively and reach a wide audience.

Impaired driving and motor vehicle crashes with traumatic injuries are not accidents but predictable events. Participation in this program allows PACEP to engage the community in prophylactic health care outside of our usual role as emergency physicians in caring for the aftermath of high-risk behavior.

We are excited about the potential for scholarly activity the grant will with foster.

PEP-PAC Update

The Pennsylvania Emergency
Physicians Political Action
Committee (PEP-PAC) is the lobbying arm of PACEP. At its core, lobbying is a means of educating legislators about issues affecting us. PEP-PAC uses its resources to attend fundraisers with lawmakers on both sides of the aisle, fostering relationships with them so that they can draw on our expertise regarding healthcare issues.

Several PACEP supported measures are advancing in Harrisburg.

HB 1633 sponsored by House Health Committee Chair Dan Frankel and former PACEP president Arvind Venkat will ban healthcare noncompete agreements and restore physicians' rights to freely practice where and when they chose. This improves patient access to care to enables physicians the flexibility to pursue their best employment opportunities. It passed the House and will likely be referred to

the Senate Health and Human Services Committee. PEP-PAC has lobbied in support of this bill.

PACEP and PEP-PAC are also supporting HB 1512 and its companion SB 739 pertaining to tele-medicine. The bills mandate that insurance companies cover medically necessary and appropriate tele-medicine services. Currently, many insurance companies do not reimburse for tele-medicine resulting in uncompensated care. PACEP has supported tele-medicine legislation for many years and it seems that there is finally momentum to push it across the finish line.

Medical malpractice reform has been an even more pressing issue ever since the Pennsylvania Supreme Court enacted a procedural change enabling venue shopping for medical malpractice cases. Venue shopping allows plaintiffs' attorneys to sue in any Pennsylvania county in which care occurred, where a defendant could be served, or where any transaction or occurrence giving rise to the suit took place. Plaintiff attorneys have already started bringing their cases to Philadelphia County in droves - Philadelphia county jury verdicts average higher than twice the national average, and plaintiffs are more than twice as likely to win in Philadelphia compared to the national average. Venue shopping increases insurance premiums, drives physicians out of the state, increases cost of care, inundates physicians with frivolous lawsuits and limits access to health-care, especially for women, by forcing the closure of highly litigated services, such as Labor and Delivery.

SB 1182 "Certificate of Merit" Legislation is being reviewed in the Senate Judicial Committee. This legislation stipulates that a plaintiff's claim must be accompanied by a "Certificate of Merit" from a physician stating that the defendant deviated from an acceptable professional standard. The physician signing the Certificate of Merit must be a practicing physician in Pennsylvania in the same or similar specialty as the defendant. This would stop the current practice of plaintiff's attorney's brining in "outside experts" who do not currently practice medicine and often aren't in the same specialty or even remotely qualified to comment on the matter. This "Certificate of Merit," among other stipulations in the bill, would greatly reduce frivolous malpractice lawsuits.

These issues have a real, tangible impact on our profession and livelihood. The momentum in Harrisburg for meaningful change is greater now that in recent memory.



The Resolution:

"Syncope & Encephalopathy" 44-year-old female presented to the ER after a syncopal episode, seizure-like activity and loss of consciousness



Test to order: CT Angiography:

"Type A aortic dissection extending from the aortic root through thoracic and abdominal aorta into the bilateral common iliac arteries and external left iliac artery" The dissection also affected right brachiocephalic artery, base of left common carotid artery, left subclavian artery, celiac artery, SMA and bilateral kidneys.

Patient course:

Patient was intubated, and esmolol, propofol and fentanyl infusions were started. Patient went to the OR to have aorta repaired but after multiple complications, the family decided to pursue comfort measures.

Relevance to EM: This case highlights an uncommon presentation of a common ED diagnosis that carries a high morbidity and mortality for patients.

- Stir well to combine and cover in the refrigerator for at least 4 hours, preferably overnight
- 3. Serve hot or cold in the morning. Garnish with your favorite toppings
